A Note from Playwright Alberto Conejero

This work is based loosely on the life of Rafael Rodríguez Rapún, a student of Mining Engineering, secretary of the La Barraca University Theater, and Federico García Lorca's companion during the final years of their lives. Rapún died on August 18, 1937, exactly one year after Federico, in the military hospital at Santander, having been wounded a few days earlier in an aerial bombardment near the northern Spanish town of Bárcena de Pie de Concha. The encounter that is the subject of my play, therefore, is fiction. The rest of the information here, however—facts, names, events, etc.—is the result of my own research over the past few years.

During this process, it was my privilege to be lavished with assistance from members of Rafael's family, principal among these his brother Tomás, who in Madrid in the spring and summer of 2012 shared with me, at the age of ninety-five, hours of memories and mementoes of their relationship. This work is dedicated to his generosity, good cheer, and high-flying spirit. Tomás's daughter, Margarita, also allowed me unlimited access to their family archive of photographs, postcards, and the like. I am similarly indebted to Toña, who lived for decades with Rafael's older sister María, for her astounding memory at age eighty-three and the gift of her invaluable recollections.

I would also like to thank Ian Gibson for his help and ever stimulating conversation; Juan Carlos Rubio for his generosity and guidance, and finally Alfonso, the son of Rafael's trench-mate Paulino García-Toraño, for sharing with me his father's memories.

A Note from Director Ignacio García-Bustelo

No one would be surprised if AENY-Spanish Artists in New York presented *The Dark Stone* as a period piece focused on the historical aspects of the Spanish Civil War. It would almost be expected. After all, we (artists from Spain) understand the culture, the historical context, and the specific circumstances of that time. We have direct access to the right sources and institutions, and we can find in our very roots the elements and pieces that shape the world of this play.

We could easily tell that story — but we have chosen to do something different.

The struggle that took place in Spain almost a hundred years ago during the Civil War is taking place before our very eyes between the nations of Ukraine and Russia. The scenery changes; the conflicts, the violence, the turmoil, in essence (and sadly), remain the same.

Current global issues demand that we examine this play anew. Rather than producing it as an archeological piece pertaining only to a certain time in history, we feel strongly that this work provides the opportunity to examine universal themes about the human condition in a time of conflict. In doing so, theater remains relevant, for it speaks to us about our current and immediate circumstances, and provides a place for dialogue with our audience.

What would it be like to have actual actors from Ukraine and Russia play these characters, say these lines, speak to each other and explore the moral dilemmas that this play presents? How would the audience react? And, perhaps most importantly, what can we learn?



The Cast



Andrew KoGolenok (Sebastián)

Andrew KoGolenok is an actor born in Minsk, Belarus. There wasn't much work for young Andrew so at the age of 17 he moved to America to pursue an acting career. On arrival, he signed with a talent agent (Ezme Arana) and a manager (Wayne Gasser) and has since been in two feature films, six short films, three plays, one musical, and two music videos.

Andrew's first big role was Calvin Rose in the feature film *Hold Me Softly* (2021). It was filmed in Phoenix, Arizona, and produced by Berber Productions. Since then Andrew has also performed in the play *An Adjustment of Love* at the New York Theater Festival in November of 2021. In January of 2022, he portrayed Vince in *The Blood Orange* (an off-off-broadway musical). In May of 2022, he starred in an episode for a web series *My Nineties*. This October, Andrew is returning to work with director Ina Bailey on her second feature film *Wander, Woman*. Andrew is playing Chase Greyhound, the protagonist who turns out to be an antagonist. Andrew is fluent in Russian and is currently a senior student at Drew University in Madison, NJ.



Zenon Zeleniuch (Rafael)

Zenon has appeared in *Shadow of Heroes* (Matyas Rakosi) at the Metropolitan Playhouse; *Meshahnye - The Philistines* (Teterev) at The Theatre for the New City; *Perfect Crime* (Lionel McAuley) at Theater Center; *Bedfellows* (Benjamin Franklin) at The Lion Theatre; *The Medea* (Creon) at ATA; *The Relapse* (Sir Tunbelly Clumsy) at The Westbeth Theatre; *Sub-Basement* (Gustav) at The Athena Theatre; and *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* (George) at CUSOTA. Regional Theatre credits include *Coriolanus*, *42nd Street*, *Bent*, and *The Irish Question*. Zenon appeared on television in *Pause with Sam Jay*, *Chicago Med*, *Madam Secretary*, *The Blacklist: Redemption*, *The Americans*, *The Knick*, *Power* and *The Enemy Within*.



About the Author

Alberto Conejero (Playwright)

Born in Vilches (Jaén) in 1978, Alberto Conejero has a degree in Stage Direction and Dramaturgy from Madrid's Real Escuela Superior de Arte Dramático and a PhD in Religious Studies from the Complutense University of Madrid. While he had long been active in Madrid's indie theatre scene, Conejero's career really took off in 2010, when he became one of the most highly regarded playwrights of the moment. His plays examine, from different milieus, his own identity and the essence of dramaturgy itself. Conejero has also become a trailblazer in LGBTIQ+ matters, with the subject of homosexuality at the forefront of many of his works. In 2018 he directed for the first time, with La geometría del trigo, his most personal work so far, which earned him the National Dramatic Literature Award.

In addition to creating his own plays, he also translates and adapts for the stage works from Classical Greece and Rome, the Spanish Golden Age, and his contemporaries and newer authors. He has also tried his hand at writing YA novels and poetry. He is the current Artistic Director of Madrid's Festival de Otoño.

G. J. Racz (Translator)

G. J. Racz is Professor of Humanities at LIU Brooklyn, review editor for *Translation Review*, and a former president of the American Literary Translators Association (ALTA). Primarily a poetry translator with a special interest in meter and rhyme, Racz edited *Three Comedies by Jaime Salom* (UP of Colorado, 2004), in which his translation of the mock-Renaissance farce *El señor de las patrañas* (Eng. *Rigmaroles*) appears. Additionally, Racz's translation of Salom's *Dos griegas* (Eng. *Callas and Medea*) was commissioned and staged by the Thalia Spanish Theatre. His translations of the Spanish Golden Age dramatists Pedro Calderón de la Barca's *La vida es sueño* (Eng. *Life Is a Dream*) and Lope Félix de Vega Carpio's *Fuenteovejuna* were commissioned for the *Norton Anthology of Drama* (2009). The two works were also published as stand-alone volumes, the former in the Penguin Classics series (2006) and the latter by Yale UP (2010). His renderings of Miguel de Cervantes's *La Numancia* (Eng. *The Siege of Numantia*), Lope de Vega's *El perro del hortelano* (Eng. *The Dog in the Manger*), and Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz's *Los empeños de una casa* (Eng. *Trials of a Noble House*) appear with *Life Is a Dream* and *Fuenteovejuna* in *The Golden Age of Spanish Drama: A Norton Critical Edition* (2018).

Ignacio García-Bustelo (Director)

Originally born in Spain, Ignacio Garcia-Bustelo is a New York based actor and stage director. As an actor, Mr. Garcia-Bustelo has worked for the National Theater and some of the most prestigious venues in Spain; here in the US his list of New York and Regional theater credits is comprised of leading roles in classical and contemporary productions presented at La MaMa ETC, The Theatre Project, Olney Theater Center, Theater for the New City, Gala Theater and Spanish Repertory Theater among others. He received ACE, HOLA awards and an ATI nomination as best actor for his performance in Lope de Vega's El Caballero de Olmedo (The knight from Olmedo). Film appearances include *Pawn Sacrifice*, directed by Edward Zwick. His role in *Silencio*, by Dee Paphangkorn, earned him an award as best actor at the European Film Festival in 2018. He also participated on the Spanish prime-time TV series MIR and Hospital Central. Off-Broadway directing credits: Wearing Lorca's Bowtie, at The Duke on 42nd Street, and the devised opera Signora Rossini, for The Loretto Theater at The Sheen Center. He also directed the American Premiere of *Dias Estupendos*, Ronensbourgh, An Invisible Piece of this World at IATI Theater in NYC, and more recently the immersive piece Theater to Circumnavigate the World, commissioned by the Embassy of Spain in Washington D.C. and the series of filmed monologues Mini Micro Theater in Central Park, commissioned by the Consulate of Spain in NYC. Mr. Garcia-Bustelo serves as the Artistic Director of AENY - Spanish Artists in New York; he is a Fulbright Scholar, and holds a BFA from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in Madrid, and a MFA from The New School for Drama in NYC.

Valeria Llaneza (Assistant Director)

She is originally from Buenos Aires, Argentina. After she finished her BFA in Dramatic Arts at Universidad del Salvador, she started working in the industry with distinguished directors such as Julio Chávez, Rubén Viani, Stella Maris Closas, Marcelo Katz as well as touring; nationally and internationally. She attended The American Musical and Dramatic Academy of New York receiving a degree in Musical Theatre. Since then, she has been working in numerous productions. Anna Bashlukova (Graphic Designer)

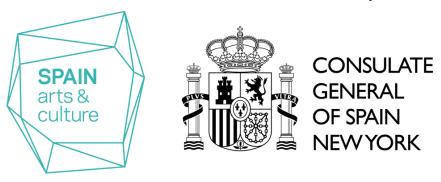

In October 2010, a small group of Spanish artists gathered at New York's Spanish Benevolent Society (Centro Español) to give voice to the growing community of Spanish creatives in NYC. AENY – El Puente emerged as a way to bring Spanish contemporary work to the United States. AENY debuted its first full-length production Wearing Lorca's Bowtie at The Duke on 42nd Street in 2011. AENY – El Puente changed its official name to AENY – Spanish Artists in New York (AENY is an acronym for "Artistas Españoles en Nueva York"). Today the company's affiliated artistic community includes actors, dancers, composers, directors, musicians, performers, playwrights, theater designers, and visual artists. In 2014, the company formed as a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit charitable organization to fulfill its mission: to foster interdisciplinary artistic collaborations and encourage a unique cultural bridge between Spain and the United States of America. AENY is committed to maintaining an experimental, collaborative approach throughout its production process. AENY's artistic leadership works to establish a stable and enriching relationship between Spanish and US-based artists. Moreover, AENY seeks to enliven the New York arts scene through its focus on productions that illuminate and examine the challenges of contemporary society.
